

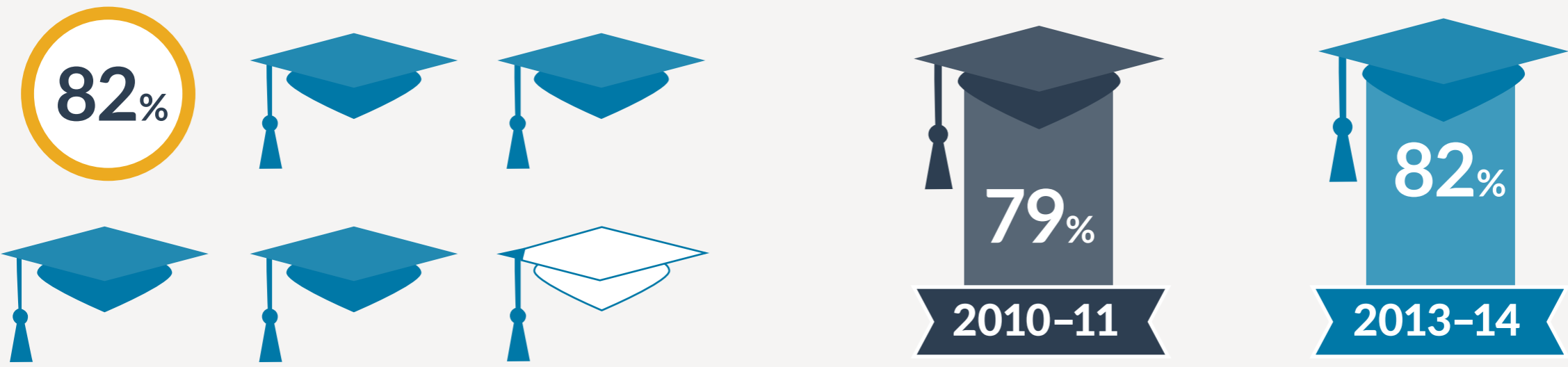
Who's Graduating?



Public High School Graduation Rates

82 percent of public high school students graduated during the 2013-14 school year.*

This is the highest rate since these data were first collected during the 2010-11 school year. Then, the graduation rate was 79%.

Asian/Pacific Islander and White students generally had higher graduation rates than the national average.



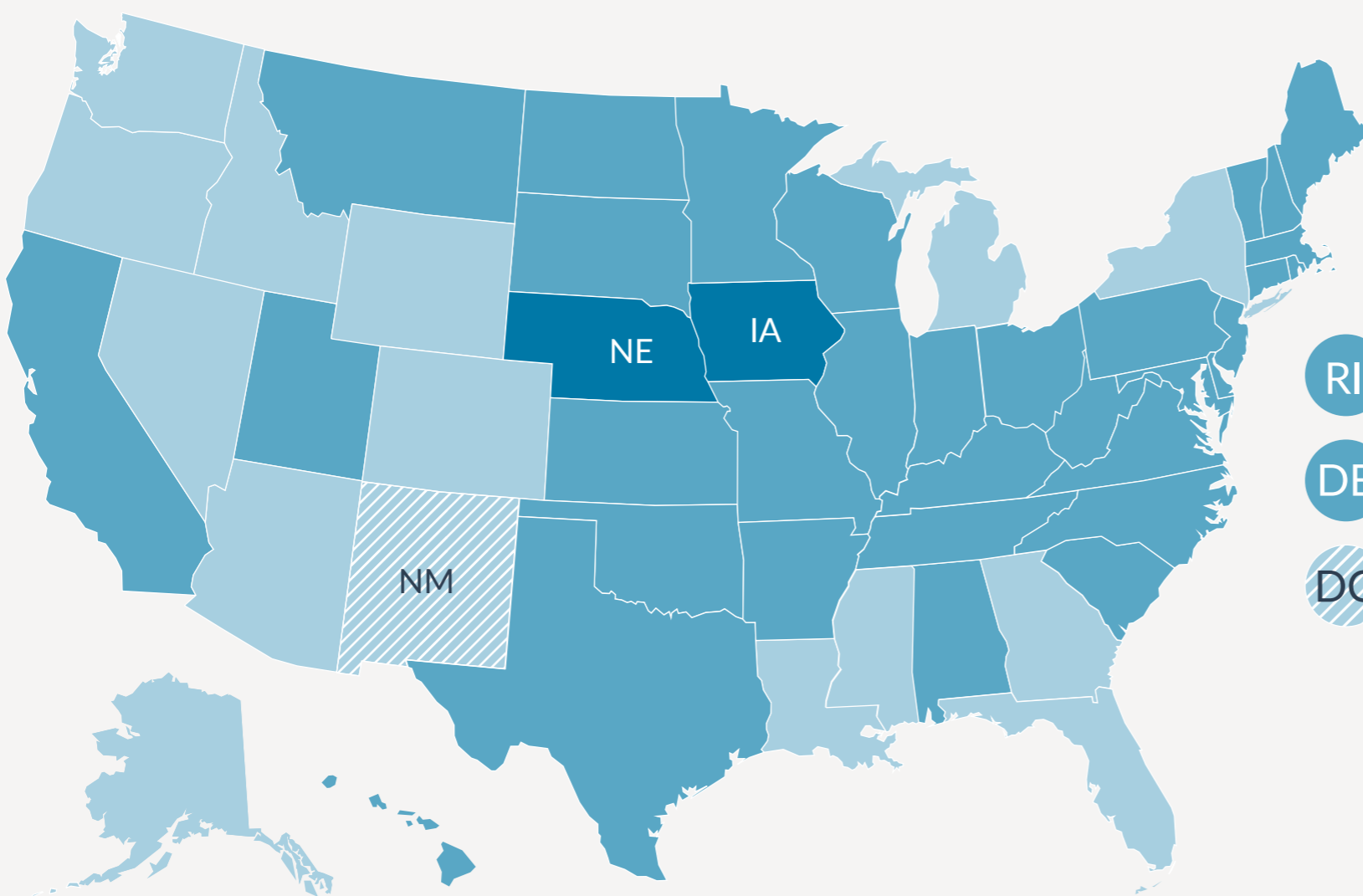
Hispanic, Black, and American Indian/Alaska Native students generally saw lower graduation rates than the U.S. average.



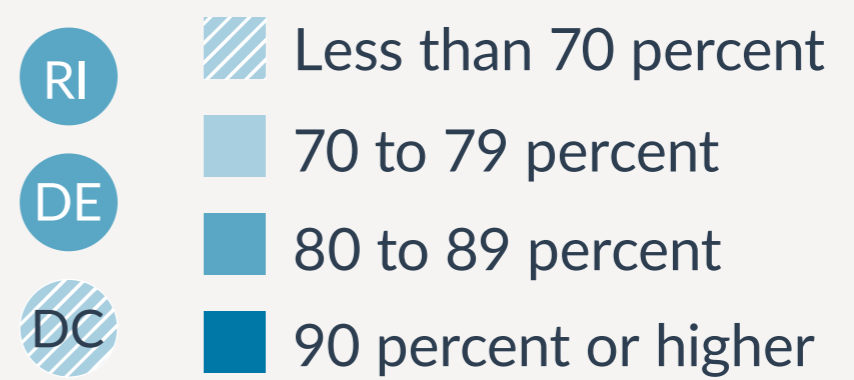
Graduation Rates by State
